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CYS Welcomes 2022!

elcome to 2022 and the second half of CYS's Season! We are very proud of everything our students accomplished in 2021. All our ensembles had amazing performances, and we are thrilled they had the opportunity to perform in front of a receptive audience, in addition to receiving additional cheers from our first-ever livestream events. Not only did our livestreams allow thousands of our audience members to safely watch our concerts from their homes, but also allowed us to reach our CYS family worldwide, with viewers in South Korea, Taiwan, Germany, the UK, and Spain. If you haven't seen them yet, head to our YouTube Channel, "CYSMedia."

March represents the midway point of the season for CYS, and its full schedule displays the riches of the CYS program. The 1:00 pm concert on March 6 at Cañada College Theater will display the breadth and depth of the CYS program by showcasing our Wind Symphony. Intermediate Strings Ensemble, and the Associate Orchestra. Kayla Lee, concertmaster and winner of the CYS Associate Orchestra Soloist Competition, performs Henri Wieniawski's sparkling and glittering virtuoso miniature, Scherzo-Tarantelle. The Senior Orchestra Spring Concert on March 13 is packed with music that's fun for the audience and a challenge for the orchestra. Young Artist Competition Winner Andromeda

Kepecs will perform the ultraromantic and hauntingly beautiful Violin Concerto by Alexander Glazunov. Our closing work is the monumental Symphony no. 2, subtitled *The Age of Anxiety*, by Leonard Bernstein. A highly unusual work, *The Age of Anxiety*, calls for a piano soloist of the highest caliber. We are delighted to have former YAC winner and 2018 CYS tour soloist Parker Van Ostrand join the orchestra for this performance.

I'm so impressed that Maestro Eylar decided to program Bernstein's *The Age of Anxiety*. For me it's a "Desert Island Piece" and one of the most rewarding pieces of music an orchestra can play. It's a piano concerto... but not really, and it's a symphony, but not like one you've ever heard. What it really is, though, is a challenge for even the world's greatest professional orchestras.

Having performed the work myself, I can tell you that the rhythms are unforgivable. To play the piece well, everyone must walk in lock step, despite Bernstein's insistence on making that task as difficult as possible. There are mixed meters, offbeats that sound like onbeats, and some of the most avant-garde jazz writing in the repertoire. For the percussionists, lining up precise rhythms with a pianist 30 feet away requires listening skills that are above and beyond. And for the conductor and pianist, there are



somany challenges to keep the whole orchestra together while it moves at a breakneck pace. Bernstein's first performance was with himself at the piano and his longtime friend, Serge Koussevitzky conducting with the Boston Symphony. I'm not sure which one of them had the harder job!

Bernstein wrote the piece in 1949 after falling in love with W.H. Auden's poem of the same name. The Age of Anxiety, true to its name, explores one's quest to find substance and identity in an exponentially changing world. Much like 1949, when the Soviet Union detonated its first nuclear weapon and the nuclear arms race began, we also find ourselves in a changed world of uncertainty and anxiety. How fitting that we have the opportunity to take an evening to reflect on this theme as we also try to find new meaning and happiness in an uncertain and anxious world.

I do truly hope you enjoy these shows. I've had such a great time meeting so many of you, please makesure to find me to introduce yourself!

CALIFORNIA YOUTH SYMPHONY SOLOIST SPOTLIGHT



PARKER VAN OSTRAND Piano - Guest Artist

Parker Van Ostrand began studying piano at the age of four. As a competition winner, he performed with the Merced Symphony, the Central Valley Youth Symphony, the California Youth Symphony, the Auburn Symphony, and the Frost Symphony Orchestra, and was invited to perform with the Symphony Parnassus in 2017 and the Camellia Symphony in 2019. In 2017. he won the MTAC Concerto State Finals Competition and in 2018, the Mondavi Center National Young Artists Competition. In the summer of 2018, he performed the Gershwin Concerto in F with the California Youth Symphony in Latvia, Estonia, and Finland, and in the summer of 2019 he won first place and the Best Concerto Prize in the Philadelphia

International Piano Competition. In February 2020, he participated in the 10th National Chopin Piano Competition, where he received 3rd place along with the Best Sonata Prize. He was also a 2021 National YoungArts Finalist in Classical Music and received first prize in the 2020 National Steinway Piano Competition, Second Prize in the 2021 Canada International Piano Competition, and recently selected as a 2021 Presidential Scholar in the Arts. He is a student at Stanford University and the San Francisco Conservatory of Music, studying with Garrick Ohlsson and Jon Nakamatsu. He previously studied with Linda Nakagawa, Natsuki Fukasawa, and Sarah Chan.

ANDROMEDA KEPECS Violin - Young Artist Competition Winner

Violinist **Andromeda Kepecs**, 18, is a senior at Menlo School. She began her violin studies at age three with Joel Pattinson, and currently studies with David Chernyavsky of the San Francisco Symphony. Her orchestral studies began in 2008 with the Golden State Youth Orchestra. She joined the San Francisco Symphony Youth Orchestra in 2017, and has been concertmaster since 2019. Andromeda is a five-time winner of the Golden State YO Concerto Competition, prizewinner of Fremont Symphony Young Artist Competition, winner of the California

Youth Symphony Young Artist Competition, and recipient of a fellowship to the Aspen Music Festival and School. She was a prizewinner of the Galante Chamber Music Competition with the Atlas Quartet of Young Chamber Musicians, and currently plays first violin for Quartet Cabaletta. She has attended Meadowmount, Online Solo Strings Intensive, and Music at Tateuchi. Most recently, she studied at the Perlman Music Program with Itzhak Perlman, Li Lin, and Catherine Cho. She will be attending Columbia University this fall.





KAYLA LEE Violin - Associate Orchestra Concert Competition Winner

Violinist **Kayla Lee**, is an eighth grader at Stratford Raynor Middle School. She began playing violin in the 1st grade and is now studying with Ms. Zhao Wei. In the 2020 US Open Music Competition (USOMC), Kayla won first place in Instrumental Solo Junior division and also received the Outstanding Gold Award during the winners concert. She has participated in the Junior Bach Festival and was selected to perform during the festival concert. Kayla attended the Young Musicians' Chamber Music Academy in Crowden Music Center, and Summer Music Institute at Tateuchi Hall. She was invited and performed in a masterclass by professor Danielle Belen from the University of Michigan. She has additionally participated in the Korean-American Music Supporters' Association (KAMSA) 2021 concert as principal violinist. Kayla won first place in the Junior division of the 2022 KAMSA competition, and also participated in the 2022 CASMEC All-state Junior High School String Orchestra as principal violinist. Kayla joined CYS in 2020, and is currently concertmaster of the Associate Orchestra. She enjoys baking, drawing, and ballet in her free time.

March 20, 1942 - December 9, 2021

CYS is saddened by the passing of Bit Seto, who passed away from a heart attack at his home in Pleasanton on December 9, 2021. He was 79 years old. He will always be remembered for his gentle, kind, and caring spirit.

After growing up in Hong Kong, Bit came to the United States to study engineering and received a Bachelor's and Master's degree from the University of California, Berkeley. While he was a student, he met his wife Ruby at Chinese for Christ Church. The two married in 1968 and settled in Cupertino for most of their lives where they raised their two sons. Bit worked as an engineering manager on sensors used in manufacturing for various companies in Silicon Valley while Ruby worked as CYS's longtime Office Manager. He was a loving father and had a lifelong passion for gardening, woodworking and classical music.

For many years he volunteered at the California Youth Symphony: he accompanied the orchestra on six international tours between 1986 and 2000, chaperoned the ensemble's annual summer camp, and served on the organization's board for almost two decades. In 2018, Bit and Ruby moved to Stoneridge Creek in Pleasanton to enjoy life as retirees.

Capping our 70th Anniversary season will be CYS's highly anticipated return to international touring. Our 2022 tour will take the orchestra to Eastern Europe for four performances in the historically and culturally fascinating countries of Hungary, Poland, and the Czech Republic.

Starting in the Czech Republic, CYS will make its return to Prague for the first time since 2014. In addition to our performance at the famous Dvořák Hall of the Rudolfinum, home of the Czech Philharmonic Orchestra, CYS musicians will tour the city's Castle and Malá Strana neighborhood, the beautiful Saint Nicholas Square, and enjoy a river cruise River Cruise along the beautiful Vltava River.

CYS will make its Polish debut with concerts in Wroclaw and Krakow. The orchestra will perform at the Karol Lipiński Academy of Music in Wroclaw - an important university and cultural center of the Lower Silesia region. The group will visit significant cultural sites that range from ancient architecture up through the 20th century.

CYS concludes its two-week adventure in Hungary, performing in one of Budapest's magical venues, along with sightseeing, plenty of free time, and a farewell folklore dinner.
